Our inspiration for Living

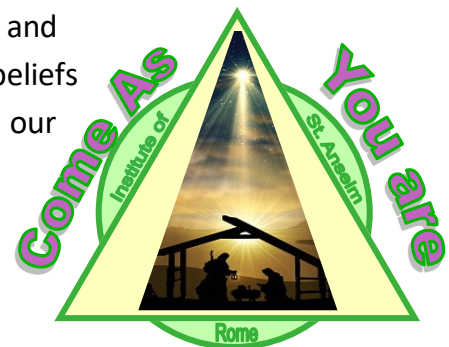


“Where is the infant king of the Jews?” the wise men from the east asked King Herod. He was perturbed and decided to kill him. So vulnerable became the Son of God when he came into this world. He even became a refugee in Egypt. Suffering and rejection were part of his life right from the beginning. How far did this rejection affect his humanity? Was the experience in the garden of Gethsemane strongly influenced by the rejection of Herod and the flight to Egypt? On the feast of “Christ the King”, which we celebrated a few weeks ago, Christ is described as coming in glory and establish his universal Kingdom. What a contrast! A Kingdom of humility, suffering, rejection and poverty in this world and a heavenly Kingdom of glory and triumph.

We belong to both of them just as Jesus did. First in this world like Jesus we experience even as baptized and with the Holy Trinity dwelling in us, a Kingdom of humility, suffering, rejection and poverty. All these aspects can become a treasure of graces which we need to discover as we remove many obstacles which we have built up since our conception, mostly unconsciously. Our journey into the heavenly Kingdom is similar to Christ’s journey here on earth. Therefore, He is our model: He is the Way, the Truth and the Life. We have a clear direction for our journey towards union with God.

What are some of the obstacles on our journey to the heavenly Kingdom? The destructive use of our emotions, the negative ways of relating to ourselves, others and God, and the insensitive ways of communicating with ourselves, others and God are some of the obstacles. Others are our loss experiences, our traumas, our rejections and hurts, our unforgiveness and hatred shown often in our body language. Many dysfunctional beliefs and expectations which we picked up in childhood cause us and our relationships with others frequent pain and suffering.

By healing these obstacles and many others we apply Christ’s redemptive work to ourselves and build up God’s Kingdom in us. What kind of Kingdom did Jesus proclaim? It is in the spiritual realm. It is in the hearts and minds of us, the believers. It consists in submitting our lives to his Lordship and becoming Christlike in his love, justice, peace, forgiveness, mercifulness, patience, obedience, humility and many other virtues. PTO

How can we establish the Kingdom of God in us? There are many ways to achieve that goal. We can begin by nurturing a deep and personal relationship with Jesus through prayer, the sacraments, meditation, regular reflections on Scripture. We need to invite the Holy Spirit to work within us to guide our lives. We can make efforts to surrender our life to Jesus Christ as our Saviour and King. We allow Christ to reign in every area of our life, acknowledging His authority and submitting our will to His. We can learn to live by God's word by reflecting and internalizing the teaching of Jesus found in the Gospels. We foster love, compassion, forgiveness, humility and righteousness to characterize our actions and decisions. We cultivate joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23). We advocate justice, stand up against injustice and show mercy to others. Another urgent area is working for forgiveness and reconciliation which are very much needed in our time. Serving others, particularly the marginalized, means following Jesus' example. We learn to grow in surrendering our worries, fears and anxieties to God, trusting that He will guide and provide for us. We need to work through the obstacles mentioned above. As we see there are so many opportunities and areas in which we can establish the Kingdom of God within ourselves. It is an ongoing journey of growth and transformation. It requires a sincere commitment to living according to God's will, allowing His Spirit to work in and through us to model His values in our life.

How can we contribute to bring about the Kingdom of God becoming more of a reality in our society? By establishing God's Kingdom in ourselves, we become witnesses to God's Kingdom in society. Obviously, the advancement of God's Kingdom is ultimately God's work. However, He invites us, His followers, to participate in it. By actively living out our faith, sharing the Gospel, serving others particularly the poor, advocating for justice and righteousness, working for unity and reconciliation, contributing to missions and outreach efforts, we play a part in bringing about the realization of God's Kingdom here on earth- a Kingdom of love, peace, mercy and justice. Let each of us make small steps at Christmas by challenging ourselves to take one aspect from the above, continuing this journey during the coming year, and celebrating each success in our Eucharistic celebration day by day. We are with Christ on our unique psycho-spiritual journey towards union with God in His universal Kingdom.

Many people struggle with three main issues in their lives: "Who am I?", their identity; "Do I matter", their importance; and "What is my place in life?", their impact. The above answers all three questions: As a follower of Christ, we have a very clear identity. We are important because we are made in the image and likeness of God. We make our impact by finding our true place in life through building up God's Kingdom in ourselves and by making our contribution to build up God's Kingdom in others. This applies to all, lay people, male and female, priests and religious, old and young.



May this Christmas fill us with a renewed purpose and hope in our lives, as we meditate and reflect on the two Kingdoms of Christ – the earthly Kingdom and the triumphant heavenly Kingdom at the end of time. These two Kingdoms need to become part of our lives. They give us a clear direction and a deeply meaningful purpose in our life to foster God's Kingdom in our own life and in the life of others. As we succeed in our small steps, we will experience much joy and peace. And this

During the summer we had quite an adventure with Fr. Len's health. We had already returned to the UK when Len became unwell at the end of July. Due to difficulties of the situation in the UK and Len being under a cardiologist in Rome I contacted him and he wrote back immediately, "Len should come to Gemelli as soon as possible for admission". We flew to Rome two days later and Len was admitted to Gemelli Hospital. By the evening he was in intensive care due to the urgent need of a pacemaker. The next day he was given a pacemaker. The cardiologist said we were just in time. After 14 days we were able to return to the UK. Two of the valves in his heart are not good but there is nothing more that can be done for his heart. The day after we returned to the UK he was taken to hospital in Margate due to blood pressure problems. His pacemaker was working perfectly but his medication needed adjustment. After eight days he came back home and recovered enough to return to Ciampino in September to begin preparation for the new intake at the end of the month. Since returning to Rome he has managed very well using a rollator and taking plenty of rest. He gives his daily lecture now sitting down and is managing everything well.



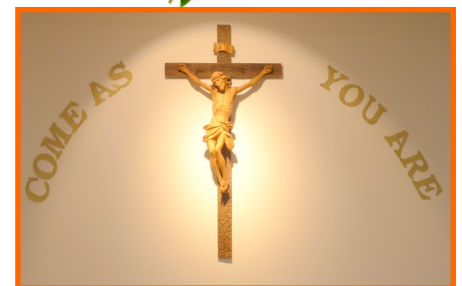
